State Deputy's Message

Preparation, not perspiration. With the right amount of preparation, the need for perspiration is greatly reduced.

The Fraternal Survey is right around the corner. Will your council report accurate numbers? Ask ALL your Knights now to total their numbers for the year and they will be a lot more accurate than they would be if you asked them next month. Anybody visit the sick? Give blood? How many hours did they spend on that breakfast in August? Next year, make a New Year's resolution and track your hours from day one (that's January 1st). There are some tools on the Utah Knights web site (under Forms/State Forms) to help you track your hours, pints, dollars, and more. I'm convinced we under-report our hours. In years past, my own council used to just copy the hours from the year before. Then the Grand Knight wanted to make sure the numbers were accurate and guess what? We were under-reporting by nearly 50%.

Have you been keeping score of your council's projects to enter your Columbian award? We have Star Council tracking forms to make it easy. There are also tracking forms in your Fraternal Planner. Writing down your eligible projects now means you don't have to think about them later. Submit your award application as soon as it is done. That way, if there is an error, you have time to correct it. In addition, partially completing your Columbian Award application now will help you find categories where you might be falling short. You have time to correct that problem now. You would not if you started filling out your form on June 10th.

Sometimes, the sweat you save is not your own.

Included in this State Update is the reservation form for the Mid-year meeting. Filling it out and sending it

Don't Crowdfund Your Family's Future

There is a new phenomenon sweeping the internet: crowdfunding. Pioneered by organizations like GoFundMe, crowdfunding allows anyone to donate to a project or cause online.

Crowdfunding is increasingly being used to raise funds for grieving families. Chances are you've seen this more than once. Someone passes away, and within a day or two a representative from the family opens a crowdfunding page to raise funds to pay for funeral expenses and medical bills.

Without question, crowdfunding is a great way to harness the power of the internet for charitable ends, but it is often insufficient.

Recent studies show that the average crowdfunding memorial page raises \$2,000-\$2,200 — far below the average cost of funeral services. Grieving families are left to deal with the shortfall as well as the additional stress of soliciting donations, figuring out how to access the money and calculating platform fees.

As the holidays approach, it's a great opportunity for you to evaluate your life insurance coverage and make sure your family's future will not be left up to a crowdfunding page.

Since life insurance guards against one of life's only certainties, it's a product that nearly everyone needs. The question is not "Do I need life insurance?" but rather "Who should I get it from?" So, at your next meeting, look around and talk to your members. Some of you are aware of small deeds done lately by a member's family. We are not looking for the deeds at the level of Joan of Arc, Juan Diego, or Mother Teresa but small occurrences that were different than the member's normal duties and chores.

Examples:

- While waiting for the traffic light to give you the "Go," did you notice and take pity on that person holding a sign for food or work? Did you give him some money for his daily subsistence?
- Did someone call you for help in babysitting when they had an emergency? And you came through and supervised their kids for them?
- Was there a friend or neighbor who asked you to help him when his car was inoperable?
- Did you see a charitable opportunity and respond? A meal for a family in need?
- And the very popular neighbor request: "I was called into work, had to work late, etc., can you pick up my kids at school?"

Small stuff but with Charity as your motive. That's the key; a positive response to your conscience. That's who we are. That's what we are all about. Single out that Knight and submit his Family of the Month Form. It's in the GK's Surge With Service Guide book or on line at the K of C Supreme website. Come on, it's easy. And remember, citing these deeds may prompt future good deeds done.
