Find the Why

There is a great book I've read about why people do things and how to persuade them to do things. The central focus is to appeal to their "why." For example, why did I join the Knights of Columbus? I wanted to give back to the church that had given me so much. How do you appeal to a man to join us in our quest to make our parishes, communities, state, and country better places? You find his "why." You do this by talking to him. The Knights have something that appeals to whatever "why" a man might have. What interests him? Are his reasons like mine? When you have an idea what their "whys" are and have them participate in activities that interest them, they will have a much more rewarding careers as Knights.

What is your "why" as a Knights leader? You might have more than one. Is it to grow as a leader? To provide for the poor? To act as an inspiration to others? No one can make up a "why" for you. I hope among your goals is a better council in a better position than it was when you took office. In a few years, you likely won't be in the office you are holding now, what you do now will have a huge impact on what your council will be like in a few years.

Here are 10 ways you can help:

- 2. Offer your home repair skills to a veteran or military family.
- Create an online neighborhood user group that can be used to share information about neighborhood activities, recommend reliable repair companies, and find babysitters. An online group may also help identify the needs of your neighbors.
- 4. Volunteer your financial, legal, or career expertise via MilServe.
- 5. Deliver a meal or care packages to veterans.
- 6. Help a veteran tell their story through a project such as the Veteran's History Project. You can download a VHP field kit from the Library of Congress website.

We need to hold ourselves accountable

Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines accountability as "an obligation or willingness to accept responsibility or to account for one's actions." Building on this I also read from another source that "the definition of accountability is taking or being assigned responsibility for something that you have done or something you are supposed to do."

When we hear the word accountability it normally has a negative meaning, but to me this can be a positive word or have a positive meaning. I take it as an opportunity to know and understand my responsibilities and to take ownership in what I am doing and be proud of what I have done.

We as officers and leaders, and Knights in general, need to hold ourselves accountable. District Deputies are assigned or appointed along with Financial Secretaries to do a job, Grand Knights and council officers are elected to do another job, and when you become a member of the Knight of Columbus you take on responsibilities. I ask you to look at yourself and ask, "Am I living up to my responsibilities? Am I holding myself accountable?"

One of our responsibilities is to grow the order, grow in our charity and in membership. You may have heard this quote before from our Supreme Knight "We have a moral obligation to ask every eligible man to join." I believe this is true, joining the Knights has been one of the best things that has ever happened to me and wouldn't I want to share that with every man that I could?

Looking at our membership growth, we haven't been holding ourselves accountable or living up to our responsibilities. However, it isn't too late, start now. Make membership growth a priority. In October, a month that is supposed to be a large recruiting month with our church drives, we only brought in 9 new members. There were only 2 Admission degrees scheduled on the calendar. I believe we had 2 more Admission degrees but they were not communicated or scheduled on the calendar. For the month of November there are only 2 Admission degrees scheduled... again that is only 2. We have 23 out of 36 councils that have not recruited a single new member this year. There is an incentive for councils; if they have a member receive the Shining Armor Award from the state their council receives \$10 each for each recipient. To date I have only given 2 out this year.

I look forward to us changing our mindset to membership 365, turning the corner, growing in membership, and holding ourselves accountable.

Pope Francis received Supreme Knight Carl Anderson in a private audience at the Vatican on Oct. 6. At that audience, Anderson discussed with the Holy Father the Knights' many initiatives including the Knights of Columbus' work on behalf of Christians at risk in the Middle East. He also presented the earnings from the Knights' Vicarius Christi Fund, in the amount of \$1.6 million.

The proceeds are given annually to the pope for his personal charities, and since the fund's inception in 1981, more than \$59 million in earnings have been donated.

A Note from the Editor

Running a Successful Retention Campaign

In last month's article, our worthy State Secretary, Rick Kump, shared the importance of retention in growing, and maintaining, a strong, vibrant council. Below is a spotlight on one Council's efforts. Perhaps you can incorporate some of this information into your own Council's Retention Program.

From Grand Knight Wayne Bauer, Council 9849

- The Retention Team contacts each of our 125 members every year- establishing one-on-one contact, mainly to just talk with every member.
- We have approximately 15 members that we cannot reach by phone or email methods, usually bad or outdated information. We are driving to their houses, knocking on their doors- again establishing onoon-one contact.
- We had around 12 members that were 3-years delinquent on dues. We are working with these individuals, helping them get back on track.
- We had 3-4 members that wanted to quit (be dropped from the Council) again, when we made direct contact with them we were able to help resolve their concerns and retain their membership.

As you can see, Council 9849's approach is getting back to the root of why so many of us became Knights, comradery. The individualistic approach of contacting each member personally helps to strengthen those bonds that we have all formed through hours of work, and play, as Knights.

By identifying and appointing a dedicated "Retention Team", they are able to throw more than one "tool" at every challenge they might face when contacting Knights who are either delinquent, or considering withdrawing from the Knights. In this month's article, our worthy State Deputy, Andy Airriess, discussed the importance of finding a members "why", while he focuses on recruiting and leadership, I think it is appropriate to point out the importance of finding a member's "why", not only "why" they are in danger of being removed from our roll, but also to remind them of their own "why" when they joined.
