# State Deputy's Message—Recruiting Tools

I was in the gathering space during a recent Mass helping my council with a church drive. I had brought old issues of Columbia magazine to hand out to prospective Knights seeing as how they are great examples of what we do, who we are, and the deep Catholic nature of our order.

One of the ladies in the parish women's' group was also there. Her husband is not a Knight. While I was getting my name and contact number on brochures and other material (after all, once you hand out brochures, who are people going to follow up with?) I looked up to notice her leafing through an issue of Columbia and I said "It's a nice magazine, isn't it?" She replied "It's fabulous." She got to the back page and I commented to her that the back page is always dedicated to those devoted to a religious life and how the Knights made an impact on their life and decision to pursue a life to serve others. She said "I know, I've been through all of these" pointing to the stack of magazines "and I love that."

She then told me the other parts of the magazine she likes so much. Columbia is an easy, free means of communicating the works of our order to all non-members, including our families. I know it made an impression on her and you can count on her telling others, maybe even her husband.

Here's an easy, free, powerful recruiting idea. Ask your members to bring in their Columbia magazines to your council meetings after they are done reading them. With the approval of your pastor, place them in the gathering space in your church. Maybe also in the DRE's office or the parish office sitting area, conference rooms, in the hall . . . wherever people gather and sometimes sit and wait. Tell people it's OK to take the magazines home. For members who don't regularly attend council meetings (I know, crazy, right?) send them an email asking them to bring in old issues and place them with other Columbia magazines in the gathering space. Replace very old or worn copies with new ones if any are left.

As we say at our exemplifications, the only part of our order that is secret are our ceremonials. Why NOT advertise all that we do, who we help? Spread the love of Christ, and maybe even convince some people that membership in our order would be a good thing for them, their brothers, their husbands, their fathers, their sons, and neighbors. This is good not just for recruiting, but for fundraising as well. When people know more about us they will feel more confident about our ability to deliver on our promises.

No one kind of recruiting works for everybody, recruiter or candidate. While this sort of recruiting is free, easy, and appealing, it could take a while to work. Keep doing it and after a while I'm confident that you will find success in recycling that little gem that comes into your mailbox every month.

Do you have other things that you use with success in your council? Let me know and we will spread your tips to other councils to help all the parishes and communities in our state.

I would like to extend a word of appreciation for the Sir Knights and our Lead Color Corps Commander, Gunny Stephenson, who provided an honor Guard on Wednesday, March 12, 2018 at St. Rose of Lima in Layton for a Memorial Mass for Msgr. Victor G. Bonnell.

In 1989 Monsignor accepted the difficult task of replacing the Paulist Fathers at Saint Rose of Lima Parish in Layton. There he relocated the parish to a new site and began construction of the facilities. He served there twenty- two and a half years, during which time he raised millions of dollars to build a modern church complex with its education center. During this time Monsignor also served as Northern Utah Dean, Diocesan Consultor, on the Priest's Personnel Board and other committees. He was active in ecumenical affairs, and he served us the Spiritual Director of the Legion of Mary Curia and Chaplain of the Swords. In 2001, Monsignor was a named Prelate of Honor by Pope John Paul II, in recognition of his outstanding service to the Catholic Church. Monsignor was also a Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus.

# 'Venerable' Does Not Mean 'Old'

When Father Michael McGivney was declared "Venerable" in March 2008, many asked what exactly that means. We know the title "Blessed" or "Saint," but "Venerable" sounds like a waystation for old souls, sort of a limbo for those hoping for canonization. Nothing could be further from the truth; so we need to look at the title a little more closely.

We don't use the word "venerable" often in daily speech, and when we do it is usually in reference to a practice that is kept more for its age than its relevance, as in "venerable tradition," or a "venerable old man" who is respected more for longevity than activity.

Yet these dusty concepts are not what the Church means when it uses the title "Venerable" for Servants of God. In the Catholic context, Venerable means not something antiquated or past its prime, but something bold and dynamic, and worthy of respect and even veneration. Far from the notions of "old and dated," Venerable denotes "heroic and virtuous."

# Joseph Shows the Way

### St. Joseph's Humble, Decisive Witness Speaks Volumes to Our Culture Today

As Catholic fathers, one of our main responsibilities is to pass on the faith to our children. We do this best by living the faith in an engaging way and by attending Mass with our family. But we also need to teach our kids the basics of the faith at a young age and make sure their Catholic knowledge grows as they do.

In teaching about Jesus and Mary, a summary of Gospel stories and a review of the mysteries of the rosary provide an excellent primer. What can we say about St. Joseph, the husband of Mary and adoptive father of Jesus, who has no words recorded in the Bible? In our online age in which every stray thought can be texted or tweeted, we can present Joseph as a model for our times — a man of action who goes against the tides and trends of the world.

Consider these five "countercultural" qualities of Joseph that can be instructive to our children, as well as to us.

Attentive. Our kids are bombarded by distracting media, yet they long for peace of heart and mind. As Pope Francis has observed, Joseph was "constantly attentive to God" and responded with courage to heavenly messengers who told him to put aside the opinion of others. St. John Paul II also said that because of his attentiveness, Joseph had the "power of making great decisions." Our children, too, can do great things with St. Joseph at their side.

Humble. Social media, as forums for idealized personas and perfect images, are not noted for fostering humility. With a little guidance, our children can see through the online posturing and appreciate the value of honesty, the foundation of humility.

Setting aside his own plans in order to follow God's will, Joseph "lowers himself and takes this great responsibility upon his shoulders," explains Pope Francis. St. Joseph teaches us that humility does not

When a Servant of God, whose cause for sainthood is being studied by the Vatican, is given the title "Venerable" it means that the candidate's "heroic virtue" has been recognized by the Holy Father, based on the best information on the person's life and reputation. The Venerable person has lived a life of virtue above and beyond the normal Christian calling, and is a model for others today, with a way of life that should be studied and emulated by all, and in a special way by the young.

Far from old and stodgy, Venerable Michael McGivney is a man for our times, a priest worthy of imitation, and a visionary ahead of his time in terms of empowering the laity to take leadership positions in the Church.

Here is what the Congregation for the Causes of Saints declared about Father McGivney:

"Concerning the theological virtues of Faith, Hope and Love both toward God and neighbor, as well as the cardinal virtues of Prudence, Justice, Temperance and Fortitude, and those others joined to them, they existed to a heroic degree in the Servant of God Michael McGivney, Diocesan Priest and founder of the Fraternal Order the Knights of Columbus."

# From Supreme—March For Life Is Largest Rights Demonstration In World

NEW HAVEN, CONN. -- Columbia, the official magazine of the Knights of Columbus, dedicated its January issue to telling the story of how Washington's March for Life has "become the largest annual civil rights demonstration in the world," and is a key indicator of the strength of the prolife movement.

Columbia reports that the March for Life, begun 44 years ago, has spread to more than 60 U.S. cities and to countries such as Mexico, Ireland, Peru, England, Nigeria, as well as Canada, where a large demonstration is held every year in Ottawa, the capital.

With the Knights of Columbus as a founding sponsor, the Washington march began in 1974 to mark the first anniversary of the Roe v. Wade decision by the U.S. Supreme Court on Jan. 22, 1973 that legalized abortion. From a modest beginning, the march now regularly attracts hundreds of thousands of participants.

"From a grassroots meeting in a Washington living room," reports Columbia, "the March for Life has helped mobilize generations to defend human life." The official vision of the march is of "a world where every human life is valued and protected."

One Columbia article, "You are Not Alone," emphasizes how the marches demonstrate that large numbers of people share an objection to abortion on demand. The piece features the experience of Mary Forr, 28, director of the Department of Life Issues for the Archdiocese of Washington.

Forr tells the magazine: "A lot of young people today see a society that tells them that women have the right to choose, that their strong Catholic values are not important. Here, they're united with 20,000 other teenagers who are all there standing for the same thing."

Columbia also reports that, after 10 years of annual surveys on the subject, the Marist Poll has consistently found that an overwhelming majority of Americans support substantial restrictions on abortion.

"It is notable that, after four decades of being told that the Roe decision is 'settled law,' some three-quarters of the American people are not content with the status quo," said Knights of Columbus CEO Carl Anderson, who has attended nearly every March for Life in Washington since 1977. "By telling the story of the March for Life," he said, "Columbia is showing us that that the pro-life cause is a robust, developing story – a history whose final chapters have yet to be written."

"Love Saves Lives" will be the theme of the 2018 March for Life on Friday, Jan. 19. The theme highlights alternatives to abortion such as providing housing and practical assistance for pregnant women in need, post-abortion healing, and support for pregnant college students.

mean passivity. Rather, his hidden life was defined by integrity and strength.

**Protective.** Our kids can feel vulnerable amid what Pope Francis calls a "throwaway culture," which does not respect the dignity of the human person — especially the unborn, the poor, the elderly, the sick and others on the periphery. In the face of harmful influences such as cyberbullying we should appeal to our children's desire for protection. As a father, show your children that you stand strong with Joseph.

Hardworking. Although life today is vastly different than in the time of St. Joseph, the demands of hard work are still essentially the same. "Work was the daily expression of love in the life of the family of Nazareth," wrote St. John Paul II. While our virtual age seeks pleasure first and is quick to demean or outsource menial labor, Joseph the carpenter rolls up his sleeves and reveals the dignity of human work. He is an example of someone who knows that hard work can be its own reward.

Loving. Our world is filled with distorted images of love that can cause our children great harm and heartache. Joseph is an antidote. Love for him was not red hearts and arrows but self-giving for the good of others. He also expressed a "tenderness," notes Pope Francis, a "strength of spirit and a capacity for concern, for compassion, for genuine openness to others, for love." Through St. Joseph, your kids can learn the true nature of love that is rooted in his care for Mary and Jesus.

Presenting St. Joseph with these countercultural virtues, we fathers should seek to imitate him in our own lives. That will be a win for our children, our families and ourselves.
