Why Boston gets a Christmas Tree from Nova Scotia every year.

Every November, a towering evergreen travels all the way from Nova Scotia to Boston to serve as the city's official Christmas tree.

The tradition dates back over a century, and the gifted tree serves as a token of thanks from the Canadian province for Boston's assistance after a disaster during World War I.

A historic symbol of appreciation

On Dec. 6, 1917, two military boats accidentally collided in the Halifax harbor, causing a devastating explosion. The blast killed more than 1,600 people, injured thousands more and destroyed part of the city along the shoreline. "The SS Mont Blanc was laden down with munitions, and it caught fire and exploded," said Nova Scotia Premier Tim Houston. "And the explosion that resulted was the biggest man-made explosion until the atomic bomb came along." In the wake of the destruction, a major blizzard hit, hampering rescue efforts from nearby major cities. ...

But that didn't stop Boston from lending a hand. After receiving a request for assistance by telegram, the city sent medical teams and supplies by train. The following year, Nova Scotia sent its first gift tree to thank the city for the help.

Then, in 1971, they sent another to commemorate the occasion and bond between the cities. That kicked off the tradition we know today — the province has sent one every year since.

Grand Knight Ryan Hlucny took this offer to heart and soon sent an invitation. The degree was a great success, bringing eighteen young members to the Fourth Degree! Additionally, two new Sir Knights joined from Assembly 543 in nearby Moorhead, Minnesota. The weekend also allowed the Supreme Master to visit the newly con-

structed St. Paul Newman Center at NDSU. The exemplification was sponsored by West Fargo Assembly 3589. Many thanks to Vice Supreme Master Brian Heger, Grand Knight Ryan Hlucny, and especially Father James Cheney (Newman Center Chaplain) for their demonstrated leadership in what was a great weekend!

A Vigil was held on December 12 around the memorial monument on Harvey Road, St. John's, NL at the site of the Knights of Columbus Hostel fire of December 12, 1942 during World War II. During the fire, a total of 99 people died, 80 of them Canadian, British and American servicemen, and 19 civilians. Another 109 persons were critically injured.



Faithful Friar Msgr. Barton led the gathering in prayer, Faithful Comptroller Gary Farrell emceed the event, and the Church Lads Brigade (CLB) provided the music, which included O Canada.



This annual Vigil is sponsored by Terra Nova Council, and organized by Archbishop Howley Assembly Fourth Degree. Despite the strong winds and cold temperature, there was a large turn out to commemorate the 81st Anniversary of the tragic fire.

Retired Colonel Roland J. Tiso, Jr.

Colonel Tiso and his wife Judie have been members of St Stephen Parish in Riverview, Florida, since 1994. They moved to Florida following his graduation from the Army War College. He was assigned to U.S. Central Command at MacDill Air Force Base and spent the next 10 years either assigned to the Headquarters or in assignments in the Middle-East.

When he retired from the Army in 2004, he continued to work as a defense contractor again bouncing between Central Command Headquarters and assignments in the Middle East. Throughout it all, Roland and Judie remained parishioners at St Stephen. Their two daughters received their sacraments and religious instruction at St Stephen and Judie taught music at the St Stephen School for four years. She ran the children's choir for several years and sang in the adult choir. Sometime after he was retired from the Army,

Roland joined the Knights of Columbus Council 14084. He is an active member of the Council and serve on several ministries including the Hospitality Ministry and others in support of various fund raising events.

Colonel Tiso published a book called IN STRANGE COMPANY, an America Soldier with Multinational Forces In the Middle East and Iraq. Colonel Tiso's account of this time offers unique insights into the challenges of planning the Iraqi campaign and the intricacies and challenges of multinational service through the lens of his assignments as a war planner at U.S. Central Command, Senior Military Adviser of the Arab Peninsula Shield Force and the Polish-led Multinational Division (Central-South), and

Chief of Staff and Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations (C-3) of the Coalition Military Assistance Training Team tasked to develop the New Iraqi Army. His observations cast significant light on the missions these units undertook and the challenges they confronted.

His firsthand account of operational planning for war in Iraq captures the concerns of the military planners and senior commanders to liberate and stabilize the country, enabling the reader to better understand the challenges of operational war planning, coalition warfare, the difficulty of stabilizing Iraq after the fall of Baghdad, the development of the New Iraqi Army, and ultimately a deeper understanding of America's "long war" in Iraq.
